## FELV+ Cat Seeking Loving Home

This petite sweetie is Shandy, who came to WHS from the Milwaukee Area Domestic Animal Control Commission (MAD-ACC). The 3-year-old has stunning green eyes and unique markings. What you can't see in her photo is her crackly meow, her polydactyl paws (she's got extra toes which make her front paws look more like mittens), and how much she adores people.

Shandy is outgoing, intelligent, and sweet as can be. She also happens to have FeLV (Feline Leukemia Virus), a disease that impairs a cat's immune system and is eventually fatal. Right now, she's not presenting any symptoms - she's playful, affectionate, and gobbles up all of her food like the rest of the kitties at WHS.

We don't know how long it will be before her health declines - it could be weeks, months, or even years - but we're committed to finding her a home where she can be showered with love and affection in the time she has left. Since FeLV is transmissible to other cats, Shandy needs to be kept indoors at all times and can't live with other felines unless they are also FeLV+. Her confidence and gentle demeanor suggest she would likely be fine in a home with kids and/or dogs.

You get to name your own adoption fee and she's already been spayed, microchipped, and vaccinated. All she needs now is you. # Helping Hazen

Does your dog try to drag you across the street because he wants to say hi to your neighbor? Or does she enthusiastically greet strangers by jumping up on them for some face time?

Every year we see more and more dogs entering our shelters with behavioral challenges, as well as calls from people seeking advice about their pet's behavior issues. They may have leash reactivity, food aggression, inappropriate manners, excessive mouthiness, fearful behaviors that can be paralyzing, or a host of other conditions requiring support.

We're proud that our behavior team is able to help these dogs, both in-shelter and in the community.

Hazen, a handsome, happy 9-year-old Golden Retriever, worked with WHS Director of Behavior Programs, Natalie Zielinski, to learn how to appropriately greet neighbor children and passersby on his daily walks with his Mom.

In Hazen's words:

"I like to meet new people, but sometimes I become really excited and greet new friends too exuberantly! My Mom was anxious about taking me for walks in our neighborhood because she knew that children especially might want to come pet me, and that I would be so excited about it that I might not stay on all four paws.

We worked with the Behavior Team at the Wisconsin Humane Society and learned a lot. First, my Mom switched me to a harness that clips under my chest, so I can practice loose-leash walking at a better pace that gives my Mom a better sense of control on our walks. The best part? TREATS! I learned to focus on Mom when



a new person is approaching, and every time I give her my attention, I get a treat!

My Mom is less anxious about taking me on walks now, which means lots of summer sunshine for us these days."
